# 2024 Campus Climate Survey on Sexual Assault and Misconduct

## Executive Summary of Mount Holyoke College Results

### Background and Methodology

Mount Holyoke College (MHC) is committed to fostering a safe environment where all members of the community can work, learn, and thrive. The purpose of administering the survey was not to minimize the experiences of individuals who have experienced sexual violence but to understand the prevalence of sexual misconduct<sup>1</sup> on campus, and on students' knowledge – or lack thereof – of reporting processes and services available. This information will help inform prevention and response efforts and provide a catalyst for enacting policies and practices to better address sexual misconduct on campus and improve training and awareness programs. Most importantly, regular sexual misconduct campus climate surveys can demonstrate that MHC prioritizes sexual misconduct prevention, education, and response.

### Survey Instrument

MHC students, as part of [The Every Voice Coalition](#), led the way in pushing for the passage of the [2021 Campus Sexual Assault Law \(CSAL\)](#) in Massachusetts. The law requires each institution of higher education to conduct a sexual misconduct climate survey of all students at the institution every four years. Within 120 days after completion and analysis of a sexual misconduct climate survey, each institution shall also post a summary of the results on the institution's website. [The Task Force on Sexual Misconduct Surveys formed by the Massachusetts Commissioner of Higher Education developed the survey questions](#) used in the 2024 MHC climate survey. The survey asks sensitive questions around topics that include personal experiences with sexual misconduct, to include sexual violence, dating violence, domestic violence, gender-based violence, violence based on sexual orientation or gender expression, sexual assault, sexual harassment, and stalking. The survey also includes a section regarding services that support people who have experienced sexual misconduct.

### Response Rate

On February 5, MHC invited 2,054 undergraduates to participate anonymously in an online climate survey (see appendix 1). The survey closed on February 20 with 409 responses and an overall response rate of 20 percent. While the Task Force on Sexual Misconduct Surveys noted that the ideal response rate for a census survey would be 75-80%, MHC rarely achieves survey response rates above 75%, but commonly achieves response rates above 50% for student surveys; we do have some evidence that the results are generalizable. A review of the respondent demographics suggests that the respondents are similar to the student body in terms of area of study, level of student, first generation status, and economic status. We did find that not all groups were proportionally represented. Another gender students and domestic students were over represented compared to the student body, while Black and

<sup>1</sup> Throughout this report the term “**Sexual misconduct**” broadly refers to a wide range of physical contact or non-physical behaviors of a sexual nature in the absence of clear, knowing, and voluntary consent. Examples include sexual or gender-based harassment, stalking, intimate partner or dating violence, and sexual assault/violence (University of Massachusetts Amherst, Equal Opportunity and Access, 2022).

International students were underrepresented among survey respondents. Results should be assumed to have a fair amount of generalizability to the student body.

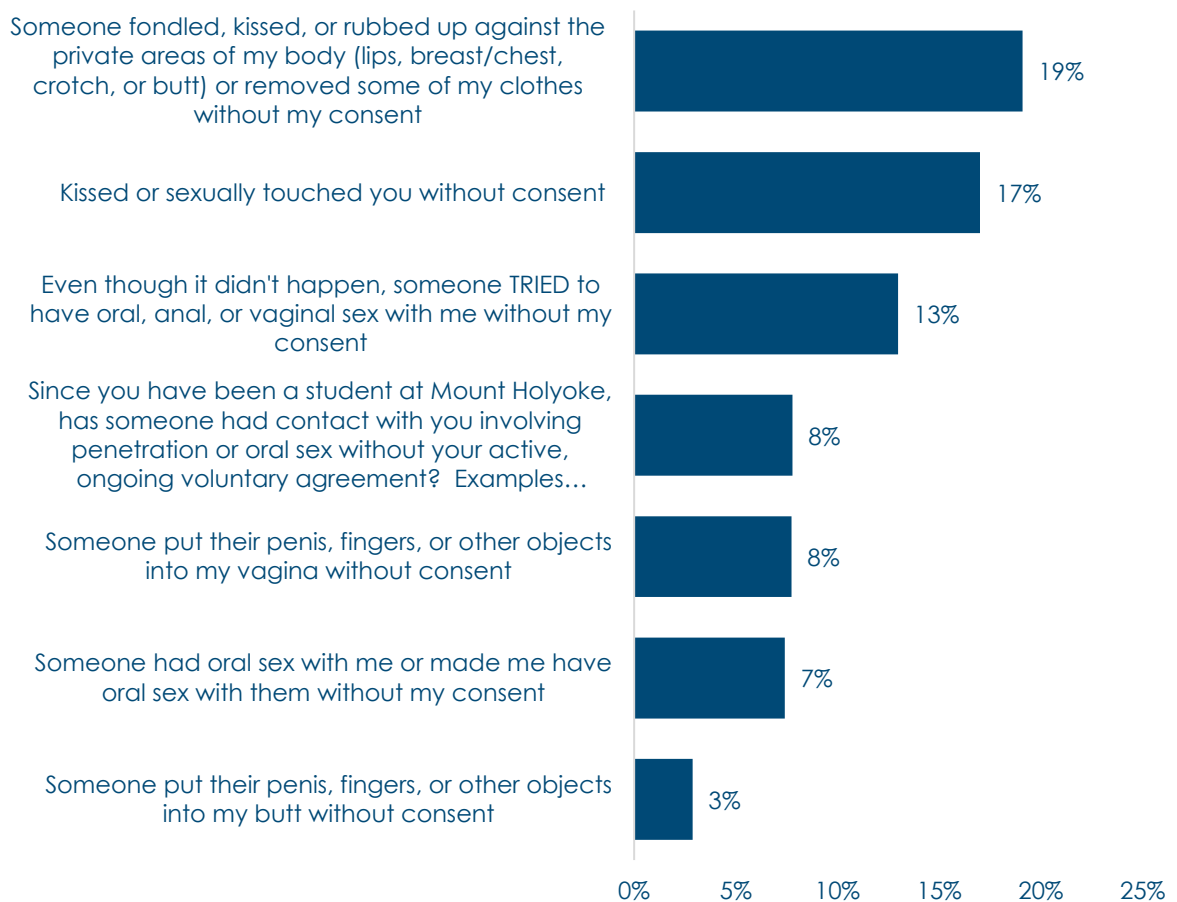
### Physical Sexual Misconduct

The chart below shows the prevalence of physical sexual misconduct that has been experienced in the lifetime of each respondent. A separate set of questions regarding if misconduct happened while they were a student at MHC reveal similar rates of occurrence suggesting that most of these experiences occurred while they were at MHC.

Since coming to MHC:

- 17% experienced being kissed or sexually touched without ongoing agreement
- 8% experienced penetration or oral sex without active, ongoing agreement

### Characteristics of Sexual Misconduct Experiences

- MHC as a gender diverse women's college has a high rate of LGBTQ+ students on campus (over 50%) and a large population of another gender students. As such we see that the gender of those engaging in sexual misconduct is diverse (42% men, 28% women, 12% another gender, 18% more than one, don't know, prefer not to answer).
- MHC is part of the 5 College Consortium and students often take classes or attend social events on other campuses. As such, experiences of sexual misconduct only happened on campus 50% of the time and 34% of those perpetrating the misconduct were also MHC students.
- Most of the time, (76%) the perpetrator of the sexual misconduct is someone the student reported knowing. Often the person was an acquaintance (27%), current partner (21%) or former partner (15%).
- Drugs or alcohol is not involved in the majority of misconduct experiences reported (38%).

### Dating and Relational Violence

- Around 10% of students reported some kind of relationship violence including physical harm or threats of violence.
- Only 1% of students reported that relational violence was related to their gender expression or sexual orientation.
- Dating and relationship violence came from both women (32%) and men (32%). Another gender was listed 18% of the time.

### Stalking

- 28% of MHC students reported experiences of stalking since coming to MHC.
- The most common forms of stalking reported include: online comments (14%), unwanted texts/voicemails (14%), online rumors (12%). Respondents also reported that people followed them or showed up unexpectedly (9%).
- The gender of those engaged in the stalking was often women (31%), sometimes men (20%) or another gender (18%).
- Stalking tended to come from MHC students (59%) and happen on campus (67%).

### Sexual Misconduct- Harassment and Bias

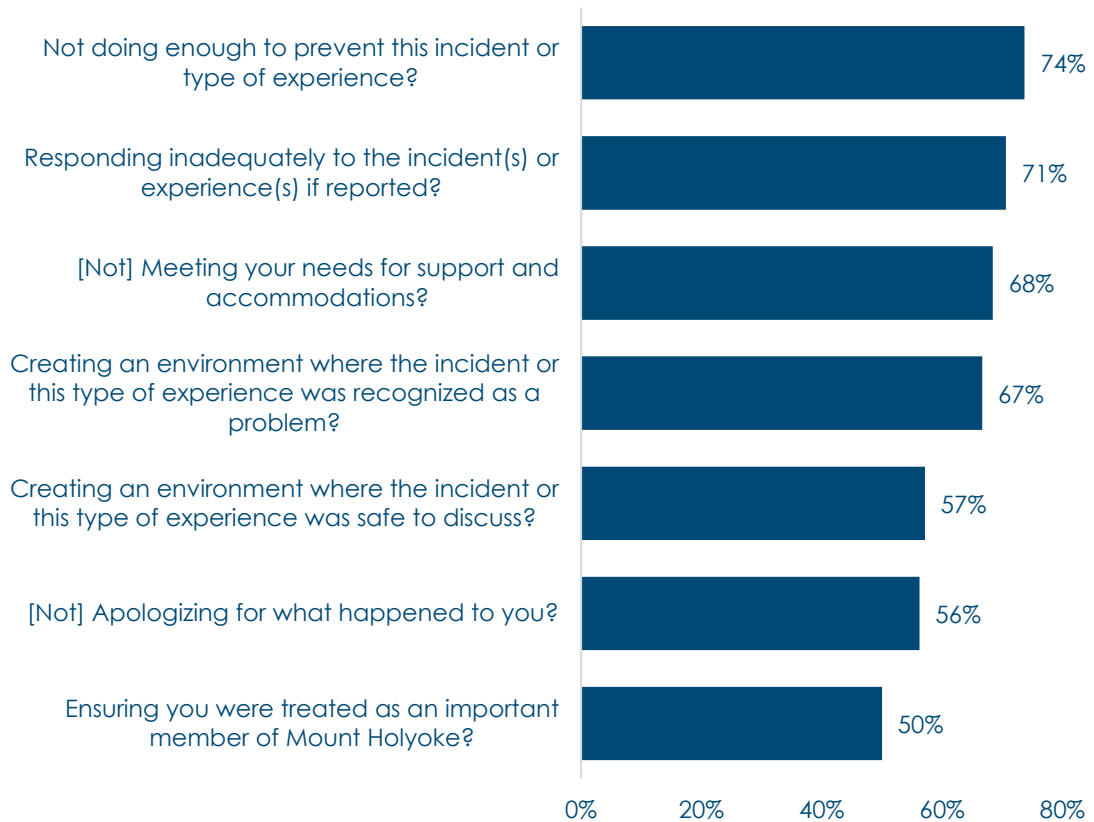
- About twice as many respondents identified sexual harassment originating from MHC students as opposed to originating from MHC employees. The majority of the harassment was most commonly in the form of offensive remarks or differential treatment based on gender.
- Students
  - Around 26% of respondents report experiences of sexual harassment or bias from MHC students.
  - "Unwanted attempts to draw you into a discussion of sexual matters" was the most frequently cited form of harassment coming from MHC students- reported by 15% of respondents.
  - As a gender diverse women's college, students who were women were the most cited source of harassment, but another gender was also a common source of harassment.
- Faculty and Staff
  - Around 14% of respondents report experiences of sexual harassment or bias from MHC faculty or staff.

- “Treated you ‘differently’ because of your gender” was the most frequently cited form of harassment coming from MHC employees- reported by 15% of respondents.
- Male employees were most commonly cited as the source of harassment (46%).

### Reporting and Support for Experiences of Sexual Misconduct

- The majority of MHC students do not know where to get information or support after experiencing sexual misconduct on campus (52%) or off-campus (64%).
- Most students don’t know where to report sexual misconduct on-campus (69%) or off-campus (68%).
- In terms of how might MHC might handle a case of sexual misconduct, the majority of respondents expressed confidence in the process. However, on one item only 49% thought it was likely that “Mount Holyoke would take action to address factors that may have led to the sexual misconduct.”
- For students who experienced sexual misconduct and reported, most felt believed and that they were treated without bias due to sexual orientation, gender expression, or race. However, there were a number of areas where the majority of respondents (n=30) felt negatively about their engagement with MHC around the incident:

### Reasons for Not Reporting Sexual Misconduct

- 19% of respondents experienced sexual misconduct that was not reported.
- The top 5 reasons for not reporting sexual misconduct were:
  - 79%- I did not think it was serious enough to contact any program or services;
  - 64%- I was not hurt or injured;
  - 55%- I could handle it myself;
  - 36%- I feared it would not be kept confidential;
  - 34%- I felt embarrassed, ashamed, or that it would be too emotionally difficult.

### Bystander Support

The majority of respondents have supported others who were in difficult situations regarding alcohol, drugs, or sexist jokes. Most respondents have not gotten involved to stop verbally or physically abusive incidents.

- 60%- Walked a friend who has had too much to drink or is very high home from a party or other social event.
- 57%- Talked to the friends of a drunk or high person to make sure they don't leave them behind at a party, bar, or other social event.
- 57%- Spoke up against sexist jokes.
- 52%- Ask someone who looks very upset at a party if they are okay or need help.
- 30%- Intervene with a friend who was being verbally abusive to another person.
- 25%- Tried to distract someone who was trying to take a drunk or high person to another room or trying to get them to do something sexual.
- 21%- Intervene with a friend who was being physically abusive to another person.

## Appendix 1: Survey Invitation

Dear Students,

I hope this message finds you well. As a community, we collectively embrace the crucial responsibility of cultivating a safe and inclusive environment at Mount Holyoke. This commitment extends to our dedication to preventing gender-based and sexual misconduct before it occurs, addressing incidents promptly upon receiving reports and supporting our community members impacted by gender-based and sexual misconduct.

In order to better understand our Mount Holyoke campus climate and align with [Massachusetts' 2021 Campus Sexual Assault Law](#), we are conducting a survey to gather valuable data from students.

This survey is part of the legacy of student activism in Massachusetts. Mount Holyoke alums are among the fervent activists who worked through the Every Voice Coalition—a national student movement founded in Massachusetts to pass survivor-centered state laws addressing campus sexual violence—to help create the Campus Sexual Assault Law which mandates that each institution conduct a sexual misconduct climate survey of all students at the institution every four years. The law specifies that the survey generates responses related to topics including, but not limited to the following—the prevalence of sexual misconduct on campus; student knowledge of and familiarity with campus practices for reporting and addressing sexual misconduct; and services available to victims of sexual misconduct.

This is a tremendously challenging topic to survey. While the survey content is largely provided by the state of Massachusetts, we have taken steps to make the survey more reflective of our Mount Holyoke community's commitment to inclusion. It is important to be aware that you may still notice the use of language that does not exemplify inclusion. However, it is vital that we collect data as we strive to improve our response to gender-based and sexual misconduct. Your participation is invaluable in shaping a safer and more supportive environment for all.
